
Helsby's Own War Memorial is also 100 years old and bears the names of the 32 men who left the village to fight in both World Wars. The Ones who didn't return.

Marshes Community Benefit Fund – Some Good News as 8 New Projects Awarded Grants

The Marshes Community Benefit Fund (MCBF) Panel reveals the projects which have been awarded funding from the annual \pounds 120,000 community payments made by Frodsham Wind Farm Limited.

"Panel members agreed to award a total of just over £72,000 to eight projects which, in the views of the Panel majority, really encapsulated the requirements and objectives of the Community Benefit Fund."

The following is a snapshot of successful applicants and how the funding they receive will be used: -

4th Frodsham Scout Group's Scout hut was, prior to Covid 19, very popular as a venue to hire out. Their **£11,500** award will go towards phase one of the planned refurbishment work and it is hoped will eventually encourage expansion of the troops who use the facility.

Alvanley and Manley Pre School

provides wraparound care for Alvanley and Manley Federated Primary School. They have a before and after school club. The pre-school plan to spend the awarded **£8,500** on purchasing a 9-seater minibus, which will enable them to transport the children between the Federated schools.

Elton Community Centre impressed the panel with their detailed application. The group plan to use the allotted **£18,120** on improving the facilities for the village whose population is now twice the size that it was when the community centre was first built. The group have already built a food bank and food pantry to help the village get through the pandemic and are now looking to provide support in the form of a community café to serve all age groups.

Frodsham Allotments manage and supervise the Association's Allotment Gardens, educating allotment gardeners, and advocating the benefits of environmentally sustainable allotment gardening. They wish to spend the allotted **£2,500** on providing a mains water supply to their Kingsway site.

Helsby Football Club a successful local football team playing



in the West Cheshire League and Wirral and Chester League. With a move to the new sports Academy impacting on their current funding the awarded **£3,000** ensure that they can meet their pitch fees and continue playing throughout the coming season.

Helsby Sports Club, formed in 1991, is a community amateur sports club offering sport and leisure facilities to the communities of Helsby and surrounding villages. This non-for-profit organisation plans to use their awarded **£8,054** to buy maintenance equipment for their new 3G pitch and a large storage container in which to house the equipment.

Ince Village Hall has fallen below government and social standards, the Hall's trustees plan on spending the **£18,000** award to begin a multi-stage project. This award will rejuvenate the hall's purpose. Using their practical project management skills and those of local tradespeople, the Trustees envisage that the project will bring the whole community together

volunteer group will use the **£2,500** awarded to expand and encourage people of all ages to take part in crown green bowling by purchasing additional equipment which will enable them to set up weekly sessions locally.

Dianne Walker (Panel Chair) praised the efforts of the community volunteer groups who took time and effort to apply for funding. It is worthwhile recognising that the total awards to date are now just short of half a million pounds.

VOLUNTEERS OFFICIALLY REWARDED FOR THEIR WORK

On Wednesday 11th November, David Briggs, Lord-Lieutenant of Cheshire, formally handed over to OPAL volunteers the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

The virtual event took place prior to OPAL's Annual General Meeting and was attended by over 60 guests. Jane Colville, Chair of Trustees, received the award on behalf of all OPAL's volunteers. "We are delighted to have been recognised by the Queen for the work we undertake for older people and carers in rural communities. Although we received notification of the award earlier this year, COVID-19 has meant we needed to adjust the 'usual' presentation of the award. It was amazing to see so many faces on the Zoom session".

To date Helsby has raised **£6,698.35** at the Tesco stand and a final village total will be available after the current lockdown, and will be published in the next newsletter.
