Readers will remember that in the last edition we highlighted the various new initiatives and resources becoming available, particularly in Helsby. We thought you would welcome hearing about how they are getting on!

In October St Paul's Church started offering a free soup and sandwich lunch on Wednesday's in the church hall, 12-2pm. The take up has been significant with 20 or more individuals enjoying the simple food and the good company every week.

Rev Noel McGarrigle told Helsby News he is very pleased with the response to this outreach initiative and encouraged by the generosity of local people who have been making donations to ensure its continuation.

A new **Tots Worship** service has begun on Tuesdays at 9.15am-10.30am with lots of creative play inside St Paul's.

Nicola, who organises the **Community Link Hub (11.30am-1.30 pm)** in the **Methodist Church Hall**, is buoyant about the success of the Hub. "It's certainly meeting a need" she says. "The Hub has already had well over 70 visits from local people who have valued finding support through talking to the volunteers. There's always a welcoming cup of tea and help to find local resources as well as the community food pantry. We are also able to offer direct access via phone and online to the local Citizens Advice."

"Don't be worried or anxious alone" says Nicola, "Come for a cuppa and a chat in the Community Hub and meet our volunteers who are ready to help in confidence."

The Hub meets after the well-established **Stay and Play** group for mums and tots, 9.30-11.30am every Monday.

At the same venue there is already the very successful **Friday Drop In**. Open every Friday, 10-12 noon, a warm place for conversation, free hot drinks and cheese toasties.

If that's not from the Community to the Community I don't know what is??

Helsby Hillside families donated food weighing in at 151.8kg (last year 147.08kg).


Our class representatives also helped pack up the donations before being taken to the food bank.

100 AND STILL FLYING HIGH

A Helsby resident reached a major milestone this October when George Coulter celebrated his 100th birthday.

Born in Dublin October 5th 1923 George's parents were both teachers. He spent his early life, first in Carlow (on the East coast of Ireland) and then in Cork. He then volunteered to join the armed forces in 1942 in England joined the Fleet Air Arm in the rank of sub lieutenant as a maintenance engineer.

George met his wife to be Mabel, when she worked in the ATS processing intelligence information. They were married in 1945 and had two children, Hugh and Margaret, and later, two grandchildren David and Ruth and three great grandchildren, Daisy, Chloe and River were added. George and Mabel moved to Helsby in 1951 to Hill View Ave and also lived for a time in Robin Hood Lane before settling at Primrose Lane. Work for George was at ICI Castner Kelner and Pilkington Sullivans. After retiring from ICI he spent time on a 3 year contract in Venezuela working for the state petroleum company. George finished his working career at the Nuclear Research Centre at Risley Warrington.

An active member of the Methodist Church, George, as a steward, was heavily involved with the planning and construction of the new Methodist Church in the centre of the village. Away from the church George enjoyed gardening and walking. After such an amazing and varied life we wish George all the best for the future.

In October 2022, I joined Helsby Parish Council (HPC) after becoming aware of the need for additional councillors and deciding I wanted to make a difference to the community in which I live. Having served on the council now for just over a year, I was asked to put together some reflections for Helsby News. Over the last year I've had the chance to learn about the different responsibilities of the Parish Council and all the work they do around the village – none of which I had really heard about before taking part.

The Parish Council maintains our parks, cemetery, and allotments and works to improve the environment of the village through local efforts and through representation on various organizations operating in our area. I've also seen the money that's made available to fund local events, including the purchase of the village Christmas tree, the funding of the traffic management that makes the Ho Ho Helsby parade possible and

the HPC Grant Show, which provides thousands of pounds to community and charitable organisations in and around Helsby.

Through being part of all this I've seen the frustration experienced by residents and the Parish Council alike in dealing with CWAC, our County unitary authority. I'm sure that everyone reading this would be able to conjure up images of overgrown hedges, non-maintained verges, extended road closures and the poor state of some roads in the village. So, what can we do about this?



Whilst HPC continues to contact our local representatives to highlight the poor performance of CWAC with little if any response (Chris Copeman not withstanding), we've been asking ourselves exactly the same question.

Within the next 12 months we plan to pilot various additional services, using council reserves, to see how and where we could improve things – it would be nice, for example, if one could walk to Tesco without having to step into the road (or a hedge) when someone else comes the other way!

But these services, if taken forward by HPC permanently, would need to be funded somehow, and this is where we'll need to hear from residents to decide how we proceed. For the past six years HPC has opted to keep the precept (the small portion of residents council tax that funds the Parish Council) the same. If residents appreciate the additional services HPC offer and the improvements made to the village, this will not be something that can be maintained. Watch this space for more news and information as we progress through the year and, if you'd like to hear more, please feel free to reach out to me or any of the other Parish Councillors.

As a final word before concluding this article, I thought it worthwhile stressing the need we have for additional councillors, without whom we may face difficulties in executing our duty of village upkeep in the future. If you live or work locally and have an interest in taking part or in influencing decisions moving forwards, I'd encourage you to come along to a future meeting to hear about the work the Parish Council does and consider volunteering. The minimum commitment for a councillor isn't much, just a couple of hours a month to attend a meeting or two, and with a full council we'd be able to generate so many more ideas and do even more for the betterment of the village.

The Appeal, which is run by volunteers who are members at Helsby Golf Club,




