SPEED CAMERAS ARE COMING TO HELSBY

Traffic speeds in Helsby are regularly monitored by an interactive speed sign on Chester Road (by Queens Drive) and by a handheld speed detection device used by the local Police Community Support Officer.

An average of 60% of traffic passing the speed sign exceeds 30mph. Given this data, and the fact that speeding traffic was highlighted by residents as an issue in the council's 2022 community consultation exercise, Helsby Parish Council (HPC) applied to Cheshire's Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) to take part in his average speed camera pilot programme.

Helsby and several other parishes were selected for the programme. HPC will cover the installation costs and the PCC has agreed to underwrite the maintenance costs for up to 15 years.

Average speed cameras monitor how long it takes to travel between two set points on a road, measured by two cameras at each point. They aim to reduce the number of people killed or seriously injured on our roads by encouraging improved driver behaviour and speed limit compliance.

The cameras will be located on Chester Road, near the cemetery and near to Freshmeadow Lane.

A Decade of Friendship and Song

Frodsham Sings Community Choir are celebrating ten years of fun, friendship and singing, in 2024.

From humble beginnings, the group has grown to 80 members (quite a few from Helsby), who meet every Saturday to revel in the joy that singing together brings.

Since 2014, Frodsham Sings has not only grown in membership, but also in reputation; having been awarded the Mayor's Community Pride Award in 2017, the Big Bees Breakfast Club of the Year Award in 2019 and Highly Commended at the Cheshire West Voluntary Arts Network in 2022. The choir is also well known for its fundraising efforts for local charities, having raised an impressive £20,000 over its lifetime, including £4000 alone in 2023.

But the group isn't resting on its laurels for its anniversary year. After an audition process, they have been chosen to perform at the Llangollen International Eisteddfod outside stages in July.


Musical Director Ian Oulton said "It's incredibly exciting to have been chosen and we're really looking forward to the opportunity!"

Foxhill Brook originates in Commonside, passes down the Ridgeway and then along Godscroft Lane. It has long been an area of concern for Helsby residents. Strange smells, colour and possible deaths of animals, after drinking the water, have been reported over the years. The stream is fed by a ditch that leads via drains from the outflow shown in this photo, taken at the beginning of March 24 in Helsby.

This outflow leads from a historic tip on Commonside, a field used to dump tonnes of chemicals from industries including BICC and Stanlow in the 1960s. Two brothers bought the land and acquired planning permission from Runcorn Rural District Council to operate a waste disposal business on the site. Dumping continued at Commonside for 16 years before closure in the 1970s. One brother was prosecuted in 1994. The land has no ownership at present.

Testing of Foxhill Brook over the years has shown fairly high levels of PCBs, a group of highly toxic and environmentally persistent chemicals used in the cable industry. When questioned about Foxhill Brook the Environment Agency has previously told me it wasn't considered a contaminated site. A national campaign to deal with PCB pollution believes this isn't true and has been pushing the council for further answers about Commonside. This has led to the council recently testing the stream, the first time for 15 years. Hopefully we will soon have some answers and a pathway to deal with this local problem that has been ignored for too long.

NB. The very low numbers of whales and dolphins off the UK coast has been linked to PCB contamination of their foodchain. In the U.S similar legacy sites have led to prosecutions of the companies responsible and 600 million dollars provided to rectify the affected areas.

Parish Precept

Helsby Parish Council has calculated that, due to increased costs, it would need to increase the Band D precept charge by around 9% this year. However, mindful not to overburden already stretched taxpayers, the HPC have requested a much lower increase of 5.4% from Cheshire West and Chester Council.

It has been agreed to cover any shortfalls in 2024/25 from general reserves. Based on a precept amount of £109,040, a Band D property will pay £52.00 (a cost of £1 per week), an increase of £2.68 a year when compared with 2023/24.

Helsby Residents who have visited the community centre or library may have noticed the landscaping work that has taken place on the land in front of the building. After identifying several areas for improvement last year the Parish Council organized and funded the works to improve the general appeal of the area whilst addressing several health and safety issues. Visitors to



Sherwood Court today will find newly leveled paving stones as well as new planters, benches and barriers between the roadway and the public space, enhancing the look of the area for everyone.

So, what does the rest of 2024 have in store?

Parish councillors have been gathering ideas and feedback from residents and will meet in the coming months to discuss and decide on other projects that need pursuing over the course of the year. Current front runners include the trimming of hedges on disputed land, cleaning street signs and organising more regular grass cuttings on the open spaces around Helsby.

The council are also starting two projects to plan how funds may be invested in future years. The first project centres on extending the available space in our existing cemetery while the second focuses on the park, playground, and open spaces in the centre of the village.

Borough Councillor, Chris Copeman, reports that recent correspondence with CWAC's legal department indicates that CWAC has accepted that the Quarry Tunnel, which has been closed for some time, is their responsibility and will move forward to re-open the tunnel in due course.

Old Chester Road however remains closed at the junction with Rake Lane.

Cllr Copeman told Helsby News that he now has monthly meetings with CWAC's Head of Bridges and a plan has been but in place which gives the owner of the derelict, half demolished Rake Cottage until September to provide a work plan for the site. If the owner fails to do so CWAC will take legal action to access the site.

MARATHON EFFORT TO REPAY HOSPICE

Local runner Cora Kendrick is repaying a hospice for the support they gave her and her family during the final days of her father's life. Cora a member of Helsby Running Club told Helsby News I am running The London Marathon on 21st April raising money for The Hospice of The Good Shepherd in Backford, Chester.

"My Dad received the most amazing care during the last 10 days of his life at The Hospice. They supported all of us and we honestly couldn't have wished for any better care during an extremely hard time in our lives. Since that time, I decided to raise money each year for the hospice to try and give something back. In May 2022 I ran the Chester half marathon and in August 2023 I faced my fear with a tandem skydive!"

Her challenge in 2024 is to run the London Marathon for the hospice. Cora has set herself a target of running in a sub 3-hour 30 mins time....7 minutes faster than her first marathon in October 23!. That's an awful lot of training.

The Hospice, which is not part of the NHS, receives only 20% of its income from government

funding and has to raise just over £5.1 million each year from donations, fundraising events and charity shops.





THE CHALLENGE OF COLD-WATER SWIMMINGBRRR!

Many of us can imagine the joy of swimming in a warm, sunlit sea off a Caribbean island but plunging into ice cold water might just be a stretch too far!

But not for Helsby Resident Lyn Broadbent who relishes as much cold-water swimming as she can get. Lyn took up Cold Water swimming properly 3 years ago and last November, having turned 60, decided, as a challenge, to enter the Winter Swimming World Championships in Tallin, Estonia.

Months of training followed with daily dips in her ice filled garden cold pod and weekly swims in local lakes, whatever the weather, always closely supported by husband Jim (despite his hatred of cold water).

She joined the Wirral Bluetits

and became part of a 60 strong Global Bluetits team at the Tallin Championships. There were 40 countries represented and the 200 strong team from Great Britain came fourth in the medal tables. Lyn found herself 25th in the world in her age group for the 25metre breast stroke.

She took part in an evening record attempt, a 25m relay where 8O7 swimmers smashed the world record. The water temperature was 1.4 degrees.

So many memories for Lyn to remember and celebrate. Lyn told Helsby News "It's not every day you get invited for tea at the British Embassy and have the Ambassador take part in a leg of a relay in Union Jack swimming trunks! Or swim in a Baltic sea at 0.6 degrees and have your swimsuit freeze solid whilst you



get changed! It was a great adventure and although I sometimes felt totally out of my comfort zone I am so glad I did it."

A successful challenge indeed. Next One... 2026 in Finland!
