Green Councillors in Search of Answers



Regular readers of Helsby News will remember that in the spring and summer editions we reported on the concerns about PCB's and local pollution drawn to our attention by Borough Cllr Chris Copeman.

Following a BBC radio 4 series which conducted some testing on the old BICC site in Helsby and at Commonside, looking for PCBs, (a group of toxic forever chemicals,) the Cheshire West Green Party Councillors, led by Cllr Copeman, tabled a motion in Council on the matter, determined to get answers rather than allow the issue to quietly drop off the agenda.

The motion found unanimous support from other CWAC councillors, and as a consequence a "task and

finish" committee has been set up. This committee is now tasked with investigating possible contamination at both sites and will report back its findings within six months.

Initially an NDA (Non-disclosure agreement) was placed on the committee by the CWAC executive. We understand that this has now been lifted and we can report that the committee is made up of 2 Labour, 1 Conservative and 2 Green Party Councillors. The Executive has now appointed a senior barrister to oversee the process and it is uncertain why this has been found necessary.

We feel sure the folk of Helsby will want Helsby News to follow this committee's work and its findings with interest.

brings that experience to the Parish Council but feels she will take her time to get to know the workings of the established Parish Council because that is her way.


We feel sure she will be welcomed by her fellow councillors for her energy, commitment and positive approach to the challenges and demands of the role.

Parish Council News



You may have noticed that the guide hut on the parish field is not in use at the moment as sadly we have no active guiding groups in the village. The hut has been on the parish field for over 70 years and no doubt holds fond memories for lots of local girls and ladies that were previously part of the association.

Girlguiding and Helsby Parish Council are both keen to save the hut and are seeking a potential new tenant. However, as the parish field is a designated Field in Trust, there are some limitations in terms of what the building can be used for. Permitted uses include sports pavilions, changing rooms, storage facilities for equipment used on the field and community cafes. Local clubs and charities and other community organisations with an open membership policy may also be permitted to lease the building in certain circumstances, especially those with a sports connection.

It is unlikely that any commercial ventures would be acceptable so although we are happy to note any interest from local businesses, we are unwilling at this early stage to consider entering a lease. The new tenant would have full responsibility for the maintenance and insurance of the building.

Review of the Neighbourhood Plan

Helsby Parish Council is considering carrying out a review of the Helsby Neighbourhood Plan which was made in 2016. The council feels that the plan could be strengthened to include more robust environmental standards for new homes.

One idea would be to introduce a building standard for any new house building in Helsby known as 'Passivhaus'. This concept was developed in Germany and aims for exceptional energy efficiency in buildings to help tackle climate change.

A review of the plan might also present an opportunity to reflect any changes in national planning policy/guidance or any relevant developments in the local area since 2016.

A formal consultation process will need to be carried out in due course if the council decides to go ahead with a review. Green Flag Pride???

Keep Britain Tidy have yet again presented Helsby Quarry with a Green Flag Award. The scheme recognizes and rewards the best green spaces in the country and Cheshire West and Chester is celebrating 10 Green Flag Awards in the borough for its parks and green spaces this year.

Our local MP, Mike Amesbury, has recently been in praise of CWAC's achievements saying "It's something we can take pride in as a community".

But Helsby residents may be hard pressed to follow his lead, knowing, as they do, that the bottom entrance to Helsby Quarry, through the tunnel, has been closed to access for more than 2 years.

During that time CWAC has denied responsibility for the Quarry.

This was the case until local investigations produced documents that showed it was handed over as part of the transfer from the previous Vale Royal Authority and therefore CWAC was answerable for its upkeep.

Now, despite the best efforts of the Parish Council and Borough Cllr Copeman, the lower Quarry access seems set to stay closed. CWAC has indicated it would cost too much to make safe.

Knowing that, can nothing more be done? Is this another incidence of Helsby being let down by CWAC?

SUCCESSFUL FIRST SEASON

As Helsby News goes to press plans are underway for the sixth and last Car Boot Sale of this season at St Paul's Helsby. Like all outdoor events in the UK, each is shaped by the weather – there have been several dodging showers and a couple of gloriously sunny days.

These small events average about a dozen cars, but over the summer more than forty cars have turned up. This seems to imply that a local need is being met both for those who are having a clear out or simply have a few things to sell. The advantages are that the site is on the hard standing in the car park, so no muddy fields to contend with and the community hall offers a simple café and toilets, and you do not have to drive miles to get there!



The car boot sales have provided a focus for the village once a month, when people can have a walk around, catch up with neighbours, possibly gain new friends and stretch their legs. 


VERGES AND HEDGES

CELEBRATIONS AT THE HIGH SCHOOL

Year 13 Students, Parents and Staff celebrated as the 'Class of 2024' opened their envelopes, revealing another set of fantastic A-Level and Vocational qualifications results for the Sixth Form students at Helsby High School.

Director of Sixth Form, Tor Cross, told Helsby News she couldn't be more delighted and was proud of everything the students had done. "These wonderful results are a very well-deserved reward for all of their hard work".

Headteacher, Martin Hill, said "The results achieved by the 'Class of 2024' are amongst the school's best-ever and above the national average. The students deserve their success and we wish them all well as they move on into the next stage in their lives"

A week later saw the arrival of the envelopes with the GCSE results and more celebrations were in order for Year 11. At a time when the pressure of GCSE examinations has been well documented, nearly 90% of the school's Year 11 students achieved 8 or more GCSE or vocational qualifications and 80% achieved a GCSE qualification in the "English Baccalaureate"
